Monday 12th November 2007 - Lexmark X4550 All-in-One. On Monday 12 November Tony Hawes demonstrated the Lexmark X4550 All-in-One, this is a combined printer, scanner, copier and fax machine which also has a built-in 802.11g Wi-Fi for wireless printing. With multi-function devices fast gaining popularity among home users most printer manufacturers have a range of similar All-in-One Multi Function Devices (MFDs).

The Lexmark X4550, first available about April 2007 at over £120 can now be purchased for slightly less than £70. This was demonstrated using a USB connection rather than with the use of the Wi-Fi facility as Tony had found difficulty in establishing a reliable Wi-Fi link between his notebook and printer. First he showed the capability of the flatbed scanner including a simple Copy using the X4550's front panel button; this was particularly quick with an accurate copy of the original emerging within seconds. He

then showed how well the optical character recognition (OCR) software (Abbyy FineReader 6 which is bundled and installed by default from the installation CD) worked, this impressively scanned and converted a magazine article into a Microsoft Word document in very short order — ideal if one wants to copy an article and extract content for later editing in Word. Other features demonstrated included the normal scan of a photo for saving to one's hard disk; using the Import function for importing files from a memory card and how to use the quite comprehensive editing features of the installed Lexmark editing suite.

In normal use the printer uses two cartridges, one colour and one black. For higher quality colour photo printing it's possible to install a separate Colour Photo cartridge. Colour printing using only the basic cartridges was demonstrated and the quality was considered to be more than satisfactory. Digital media memory card slots (SD and CF) let one print direct from the card without a computer being connected. The provision of a PictBridge socket alongside the memory card slots allows the connection of a digital camera with a PictBridge connection, in this way photos can be printed directly from the camera. The fax facility, of course, requires a fax modem in the computer.

The basic cartridges cost about £15 each.

The Lexmark X4550 "All-in-One" is a versatile all-rounder for the price.

McAfee Total Protection 2008 Reviewed by Tony Hawes

We has a preview of McAfee's Total Protection 2008 in the last issue of ROM and commented that a review copy was due. The review copy arrived and I had a chance to put it through its paces. But first an overview of what Mc Afee claims.



Installation

McAfee Total Protection 2008 comes with licences that allow installation on three computers, which is fine if you have a desktop and notebook and perhaps a kids computer too, so this a useful bonus, but not unusual because during the last 12-months or so most other AntiVirus and Security Suite software vendors have adopted a similar 3-computer licence policy.

Installation went well if a little slowly, taking 25-minutes before it was fully up and running, possibly because Total Security performs a basic virus scan prior to installing any of its many features which ensures your computer is virus-free before installation.

Click on the McAfee icon in the taskbar and you are presented with a box showing the four categories of computer protection:

- 1. Computer & Files
- 2. Internet & Network
- 3. E-mail & IM
- 4. Parental Controls

Click on the relevant box to see the current protection, with a further box that links to the appropriate configuration menu.

The most important features from my point of view are the Anti-Virus protection, Firewall, AntiPhising advisor and SpyWare protection. In use all worked as expected. The automatic update feature worked well and in the background with no noticeable hit on resources. Updates are made known by a small animated (rotating) McAfee icon on the taskbar as anti-virus signatures and other updates are being downloaded and installed. At the conclusion of updates a larger box on your desktop notifies you that updates have been downloaded and installed.

The Antivirus tools are very effective and scans are carried out on files on access, when downloading an e-mail attachment, on demand, and on schedule.

I have a fairly full set of hard disks and a full 'on demand' virus and spyware scan took around 45-minutes.

As in previous versions McAfee refer to threats as Potentially Unwanted Programs (PUPs). At the conclusion of a scan its wise to check the results and decide if any of the found PUPs need removing (not an easy task for a novice). Although Virus files are deleted automatically there are some programs that McAfee has decided are potential threats. These are flagged with the option to "Trust" or "Remove."

As can be seen from the screen shots on the previous page and alongside, in use McAfee Total Protection 2008 appeared to cover most threats in a more than adequate manner in that Phishing e-mails were detected, Viruses and my pet test Trojan were identified with the warning box asking whether it should be deleted. I also trying installing known adware and spyware, both of which were detected.

Daily updates were done seamlessly in the background with a minimal effect on resources.

Conclusion


I wasn't too happy with last year's McAfee 2007 offering, it disagreed with some of Vista's features and interfered with and clashed with the anti-spam features of Windows Mail. However McAfee Total Protection 2008 has definitely rectified some the earlier version's foibles and is a well specified and comprehensive protection package.


For a novice it's simple and easy to use, offering all the none-intervention features required to keep your computer safe and free of nasties. For experts, once you start digging there are plenty of features to keep you happy and protected.

Another useful tool for the paranoid is the Site Advisor. If the site you are visiting is deemed safe McAfee SiteAdvisor flags it with a green box as shown above....



...However a dubious site is flagged in red with an additional red-ringed pop-up box showing there may be trouble ahead if you proceed further.

Nero 8

Reviewed by Laurence Fenn

The new version of Nero has grown in size and requirements from its predecessors. Whereas Nero 7 would only need Windows 98 or better running on a 800MHz Pentium III processor with 128MB of RAM, Nero 8 needs Windows 2000 SP4 or later. On top of this you will need a 1GHz Pentium III processor, 256MB of RAM (512MB for Vista), 1.5GB of available hard disk space and DirectX 9.0C or higher.


Installation

Installation still seems to take ages, even using the default settings. InCD, the packet writing software, is still not included by default, which has been the case for some time now. It can conflict with other software, and with the price of discs so cheap, the ability to drop files onto a CD/DVD like a hard disc seems a bit old fashioned.



Start Menu Shortcuts:

The Start Menu shortcuts have been changed to show just the applications in the program folder, then a sub menu for the toolkit apps (all eight of them, including the new Rescue Agent), and the manuals. All but three are help files and the remaining three out of the nineteen listed are PDFs.



Nero BurningROM:

The main application, Nero BurningROM hasn't really changed at all. There's a new overlay animation when you start the program, and the icons have changed in the program itself, but it works pretty much the



same way. When using RW discs, Nero always checks if the disc is empty and offers to erase the data if it is not. There is a Quick or Full option, but when you are burning a disc, it uses the quick one. It makes the process very easy as it handles the disc for you, wiping it before burning the new data.

One of the many small niggles with the software is that creating a disc image still only gives you the option of using the Nero's NRG format. You can load and write standard ISO images to disc, but unlike many other CD programs you cannot create your own ISO images.

The log file after burning a disc doesn't say how long the process took. The progress window has an estimate, but it would be nice to know exactly how long it took. The log is shown in a window underneath the burning completed dialog, but I couldn't find a way of permanently switching it off. There is a detail button that will hide it, but as I tend to verify the discs I burn, I rarely need to see the log.



Nero Express

Some of the programs have had very little change. The Back Up program has a few more file filters and encryption algorithms but other than that there is no difference between this and previous versions. The Cover Designer has some new templates but the bug of showing incorrect size of files and folders when creating a Standard data disc booklet with a template is still there. Nero Express looks different, but functions exactly the same, giving a simple way to access the main features of BurningROM application



Nero StartSmart

The program that has seen the most change is Nero StartSmart. Previous versions relied on the front-end interface to steer users to the appropriate component program. There were problems as you had to double back if you chose the wrong path. The redesigned Smart-Start incorporates some common functions. You can now rip audio files, copy discs, and burn audio and data discs without having to leave the navigation aid. The options are better organized and easier to access. Shortcuts to the frequently used applications in the collection are helpful, but when you use SmartStart you have fewer options. If you want to use all the whole options available you should use the full programs.

Nero Home looks and functions like Windows Media Center, but does not require a Windows Media Center PC to run as the host. A wizard leads you through a set-up process that includes selecting your country, language, background appearance, font size and any television/radio tuner that is identified by the program. You will then need to let the software scan your system for various types of media files and channels detected by the tuner if you have one. This process is rather time consuming but does need to be carried out in order to gain the full benefit of this software that can manage home entertainment needs by playing, cataloguing media files and offering search capabilities.

Additional tools available in Nero bundle give the user a chance to test the health of the disc drives with DiscSpeed, reduce noise of the drive with DriveSpeed, assign which users have burn rights with Nero BurnRights or learn the insides of your computer with Nero InfoTool.

Because the new data-recovery tool, Nero RescueAgent, is a toolkit utility, it is inaccessible from SmartStart, as are all the toolkit applications. The program can recover files

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that were incorrectly or incompletely written to a CD or DVD. Through a very simple interface, you select the drive with the damaged disc, choose the files you want to retrieve, and select the directory to which you want to save them. With multi-session discs formatted using a packet-writing UDF file system, you may also be able to recover older versions of the deleted data.



Nero Rescue Agent

DVD creation is available in Nero BurningROM and Nero Recode deals with manipulating them. All the options have remained the same so you can recode a DVD to DVD, recode only main movie (DVD movie ripping), compile a DVD with DVD files on your computer or recode DVD to MP4 format. Although Blu-ray and HD DVD playback isn't new to Nero (it was introduced as an upgrade to version 7), the company has broadened its support. If you have a Blu-ray recorder, you can create a BD-AV (Blu-ray Disc Audio/Visual) disc encoded with DV or MPEG-2 video files. You can then play the BD-AV disc either on your PC by using the included Nero Showtime component or on a standalone Blu-ray player. Nero 8 can also burn Blu-ray data discs.



Nero Vision

The video editor in Nero Vision is fairly basic. You're limited to just one video and two audio tracks. This latest version of Nero Vision is also YouTube and MySpace friendly. Enter your log-in and password and you can easily import or export video files from within Nero Vision. It is no substitute for a full video editing program, however.

The 2D and 3D menu templates help you create and burn video CD and DVD projects. The 3D menus are impressive but you have to remember that they take up quite a bit of room on the disc, leaving less space for your video files. You can quickly preview how the 3D menus would interact with your video files by using Nero Vision's simulated remote control (which resembles the remote that ships with standalone DVD players).

Apart from the interface change and SmartStart, there only seems to be the odd

tweak here and there. The installation is still a mess, taking far too long to install. I had problems with file associations changing for video and graphic files, as Nero wants to handle everything. I'm happy with Media Player playing the videos and my graphics programs looking after my pictures. Media Player can also rip music from CDs, so that's another function Nero didn't need to include. With all the extra templates included, the installation disc is now a DVD rather than a CD (there's around 990MB of setup files). Printed documentation is sparse; you get a few pages of set-up instructions in the multi-language Quickstart Guide, but for more detailed information regarding the various applications, you need to access one of the many on-line manuals installed to your hard drive.

If you don't have any video, graphic or audio programs, and you don't have any of the previous versions, then Nero 8 can provide everything you need. However, if you have older versions of Nero, in particular version 7, there is little point in upgrading.

Aviators are able to test their skills and heroism in many new missions while enjoying three exciting new aircraft and the ability to share rewards, photos and videos with friends and the broader flight simulator community. Flight Simulator X — Acceleration takes advantage of Windows Vista



as well as DirectX 10.

"Flight Simulator X" is required to use "Flight Simulator X — Acceleration Expansion Pack". FSX was released in October 2006 and was the subject of a full review in the December 2006 issue of ROM.

So What's New?

Challenge friends in the new racing mode, or test your flight skills in the 20 new missions like being a NASA test pilot, performing search and rescue on an ocean liner, or navigating a whiteout blizzard in the backcountry. Also included are six new scenery maps including the well-known Red Bull Air Race courses, and three new planes: the F/A-18A Hornet, EH-101 Helicopter and WWII P-51D Mustang.

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Shortly before this issue of ROM went to press your editor was sent a copy by Microsoft's Games Press PR agency. It wasn't a fully boxed product but appeared to be an in-house pre-release version on DVD. However, this did allow me to have a peek at what's new, let me make a few comments and observations and allow me to grab a few screen shots.

It's Hard

I must say that even my 4,000-hours of flying with the RAF wasn't much help when trying to land a F/A 18 Hornet on an aircraft carrier, for some reason I always manage to miss the arrestor cables, so conclude Navy life is not for me. I faced similar problems when it came to landing the EH-101 helicopter high-up in the snows of the mountains. I never seemed to get the descent right and wound-up by being wound-around as the main rotor bashed into the mountainside. The WWII P-51 Mustang was much better, I raced around the Reno aerial race circuit against com-

puter generated AI racers, but haven't as yet managed to be the winner, but I'm still practicing! Air racing pundits will say I am too high banking around the turns, but at least I survived.

Finally the Red Bull racing circuits are distinctly dangerous. Banking around inflated pylons is even harder than all the other missions in Acceleration Pack; I just crashed as regularly as clockwork each time as I tried to fly between the pylons and immediately banked to aim for the next set of pylons. Either the wings of the plane are too long or the pylons are too short, doing 90-degree banks at 150-knots whilst twenty-feet above ground left me wanting to go back to flying a nice slow Cessna or Mooney, where the ground comes up to meet you at a nice steady pace rather than the extremes demanded of Red Bull racing, where everything happens in split-second timing.

A Speedy F/A 18 Hornet

Mind you I was impressed by the speed

of the F/A 18 — take-off from RAF Northholt in northwest London, leave full power on and by the time you've reached Wembley stadium you are whizzing along at one and a half times the speed of sound — an unlikely real-life scenario, but it's an impressive illustration of what a modern toy for the boys can do. Its also worth mentioning that although the F/A 18 comes in authentic US Navy (and other countries liveries), its not possible to fire its guns or drop bombs on a potential enemy.

Cocked-up Textures

Disappointingly Microsoft's Acceleration Expansion Pack has re-introduced a problem that came with the original FSX program. When it was released and flying in and around London over the Thames there were a variety of false land-masses with the Thames blocked by dry land-bridges, bridges where bridges don't exist (for example there are two false bridges just to the west of the Dome) in reality of course there are no bridges at all between the M25 QEII Bridge at Dartford and Tower Bridge in the

city. Not too long after FSX was released Microsoft issued a FSX patch to resolve this glaring anomaly and later still a Service Pack (SP1), but installation of the Acceleration Pack has re-introduced this glitch. See the Tower Bridge picture on the next page for an illustration of the problem.



New Year's Resolution — Five Ways to Speed up Your PC

It's the time of year when one can and should make a New Year's Resolution. As computer users' one easy way to keep your PC running sweetly is to use some of Windows simple built in maintenance tools, so why not resolve to do a few simple tasks to make the most of your computers capabilities?

By following a few simple guidelines, you can maintain your computer and keep it healthy by using the simple tools that come with Windows XP (with Service Pack 2) or Windows Vista, you can efficiently maintain your computer and safeguard your privacy when you're online.

Free up Disk Space

By freeing disk space, you can improve the performance of your computer. The Disk Cleanup tool helps you free up space on your hard disk. The utility identifies files that you can safely delete, and then enables you to choose whether you want to delete some or all of the identified files.

Use Disk Cleanup to:


1. Remove temporary Internet files.

- Remove downloaded program files (such as Microsoft ActiveX controls and Java applets).
- 3. Empty the Recycle Bin.
- 4. Remove Windows temporary files.
- 5. Remove optional Windows components that you don't use.
- 6. Remove installed programs that you no longer use.


Tip: Typically, temporary Internet files take the most amount of space because the browser caches each page you visit for faster access later.

To use Disk Cleanup

 Click Start, point to All Programs, point to Accessories, point to System Tools, and then click Disk Cleanup. If several drives are available, you might



- be prompted to specify which drive you want to clean.
- 2. In the Disk Cleanup for dialog box, scroll through the content of the Files to delete
- 3. Choose the files that you want to delete.
- 4. Clear the check boxes for files that you



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- don't want to delete, and then click OK.
- When prompted to confirm that you want to delete the specified files, click Yes.

After a few minutes, the process completes and the Disk Cleanup dialog box closes, leaving your computer cleaner and performing better.

Speed up Access to Data

Disk fragmentation slows the overall performance of your system. When files are fragmented, the computer must search the hard disk when the file is opened to piece it back together. The response time can be significantly longer.


Disk Defragmenter is a Windows utility that consolidates fragmented files and folders on your computer's hard disk so that each occupies a single space on the disk. With your files stored neatly end-to-end, without fragmentation, reading and writing to the disk speeds up.

When to run Disk Defragmenter: In addition to running Disk Defragmenter at regular intervals — monthly is optimal — there are other times you should run it too, such as when:

- You've add a large number of files.
- Your free disk space totals 15 percent or less
- You install new programs or a new version of Windows.

To Use Disk Defragmenter:

 Click Start, point to All Programs, point to Accessories, point to System Tools, and then click Disk Defragmenter.



- 2. In the Disk Defragmenter dialog box, click the drives that you want to defragment, and then click the Analyze button. After the disk is analyzed, a dialog box appears, letting you know whether you should defragment the analyzed drives. Tip: You should analyze a volume before defragmenting it to get an estimate of how long the defragmentation process will take. A badly fragmented disk can take hours.
- 3. To defragment the selected drive or drives, click the Defragment button. Note: In Windows Vista, there is no graphical user interface to demonstrate the progress but your hard drive is still being defragmented.

- 4. After the defragmentation is complete, Disk Defragmenter displays the results.
- To display detailed information about the defragmented disk or partition, click View Report.
- 6. To close the View Report dialog box, click Close.
- To close the Disk Defragmenter utility, click the Close button on the title bar of the window.

Detect and Repair Disk Errors


In addition to running Disk Cleanup and Disk Defragmenter to optimize the performance of your computer, you can check the integrity of the files stored on your hard disk by running the Error Checking utility.

As you use your hard drive, it can develop bad sectors. Bad sectors slow down hard disk performance and sometimes make data writing (such as file saving) difficult, or even impossible. The Error Checking utility scans the hard drive for bad sectors, and scans for file system errors to see whether certain files or folders are misplaced.

If you use your computer daily, you should run this utility once a week to help prevent data loss.

To Run the Error Checking Utility:

- 1. Close all open files.
- 2. Click Start, and then click My Computer.
- In the My Computer window, rightclick the hard disk you want to search for bad sectors, and then click Properties
- 4. In the Properties dialog box, click the Tools tab.
- 5. Click the Check Now button.
- 6. In the Check Disk dialog box, select the Scan for and attempt recovery of bad sectors check box, and then click Start.
- 7. If bad sectors are found, choose to fix them



Tip: Only select the "Automatically fix file system errors" check box if you think that your disk contains bad sectors.

Protect Your Computer Against Spyware

Spyware collects personal information without letting you know and without asking for permission. From the Web sites you


visit to usernames and passwords, spyware can put you and your confidential information at risk. In addition to privacy concerns, spyware can hamper your computer's performance.

To combat spyware, you might want to consider using Microsoft Windows Defender, which is included in Windows Vista, and is available as a free download for Microsoft XP SP2. Alternatively, there are other free antispyware software programs available.

Learn All About ReadyBoost

If you're using Windows Vista, you can use ReadyBoost to speed up your system. A new concept in adding memory to a system, it allows you to use non-volatile flash memory — like a USB flash drive or a memory card — to improve performance without having to add additional memory.

Windows ReadyBoost



Windows ReadyBoost improves system memory and boosts performance.

Adding system memory (typically referred to as RAM) is often the best way to improve a PC's performance, since more memory means more applications are ready to run without accessing the hard drive. However, upgrading memory can be difficult and costly, and some machines have limited memory expansion capabilities, making it impossible to add RAM.

So Windows Vista introduced Windows ReadyBoost, a new concept in adding memory to a system. You can use non-volatile flash memory, such as that on a universal serial bus (USB) flash drive, to improve performance without having to add additional memory "under the hood."

The flash memory device serves as an additional memory cache — that is, memory that the computer can access much more quickly than it can access data on the hard drive. Windows ReadyBoost relies on the intelligent (Continued on page 12)

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memory management of Windows Super-Fetch and can significantly improve system responsiveness.


It's easy to use Windows ReadyBoost. When a removable memory device such as a USB flash drive or a secure digital (SD) memory card is first inserted into a port, Windows Vista checks to see if its performance is fast enough to work with Windows ReadyBoost. If so, you are asked if you want to use this device to speed up system performance. You can choose to allocate part of a USB drive's memory to speed up performance and use the remainder to store


files.
