

# Adobe Premiere Elements 8 Tony Hawes takes a look

### Introduction

It's now four years since I last reviewed Adobe Premiere Elements and with the launch of Version 8 considered it time to have a look at how Premiere Elements has evolved since then.

Based on the professional functionality of the very much more expensive Adobe Premiere CS4, Adobe Premiere Elements 8 automates some of the more routine tasks involved in editing home videos. Even a relative beginner can experiment with video editing effects such as transitions, titles and audio. Using Adobe Premiere Elements, footage can be easily captured from a DV camcorder and edited with professional-level effects and delivered as custom DVDs, complete with menus and scene indexes to share with family and friends.

The review sample came as the bundled version together with Adobe Photoshop Elements 8 for consumer-level photo editing. Although currently available as separate products, the two programs bundled together in a single retail package will appeal, as together in one affordable solution, these products offer users a powerful software combination to easily blend still photos with video clips. They allow the creation of lively slideshows and photo-rich video projects that can be burned to DVD and easily viewed by friends and family on the TV screen.

### Editing Made Easy

Essential features in Adobe Premiere Elements include:

- reliable transfer of footage from DV camcorders
- automatic shifting of video clips to fill in any gaps whenever scenes are trimmed or rearranged
- integrated DVD burning, which makes it simple to create watchable DVDs.

Users can experiment with a wide range of easy-to-use special effects, like warping, twirls and pans, as well as broadcastquality scene transitions and titles. Adobe Premiere Elements customers can easily add sound effects and music — using multiple audio tracks — to set the mood for their home movies.

### In Use

As the sales of Camcorders soar and prices fall, Adobe have clearly realised that there is a vast consumer market for video editing software and being a market leader in the professional video editing field with Adobe Premiere CS4, Adobe have with Premiere Elements, swapped the complicated Premiere CS4 interface with the relatively simple Elements one. However this approach has one obvious problem, the



availability of alternative consumer-level video editing programs from the likes of Pinnacle, Sony and Ulead who've been selling and developing easy to use video editing programs for a number of years and who have refined their programs' interfaces specifically for the consumer market.

Adobe has clearly aimed Premiere Elements 8 at video-editing novices, or those who have some experience of editing who plan or aspire to use the capabilities of its professional and very expensive ( $\pounds 700+$ ) bigger brother, Adobe Premiere CS4 for their video editing and DVD creation.

### **One Big Problem**

I looked forward to doing this review with some pleasure, but sadly ran into an intractable problem. I've upgraded my standard desktop computer to Windows 7 and have been pleased with its rejuvenated performance so far, so was bothered and concerned that Premiere Elements wouldn't recognise my JVC GDR93 Camcorder. Each time I opened Premier Elements and clicked on my JVC camcorder to Capture (Import) video footage an error message came up "No DV Camcorder Connected". I tore my hair out as I puzzled as to why it wouldn't work. Finally I read the readme file. This stated "Capturing and Importing Video. DV Device control will be disabled and capture will not proceed normally if sound card is not present or offline". As I don't have a sound card, using the RealTek ALC Audio chip from my motherboard to drive my monitor's built-in mini speakers, this left me puzzled.

Adobe's support web site offered no further advice, only a list of camcorders that were known to work with Premiere Elements, my JVC wasn't on the list, so assumed that as it is now over four years old my camcorder it is just too old. Eventually having slept on the problem I fished out my recently retired HD that still had Vista as an

OS, installed Premiere Elements and Bingo! — it worked. The problem appears to be with Windows 7, not Premiere Elements, but why would Adobe offer advice that is wrong? After all if it works with Vista it should work with Windows 7. So the review was conducted using Windows Vista.

### Importing Video Clips

The process of getting your video clips into your computer is relatively simple with the interface offering two ways to generate mov-(*Continued on page 7*)




Fig. 5: Pre-Drawn Titles — Ideal for the opening of your video. Just add your own text

Ask yourself when did you last see a gimmicky transition used in a commercial film or TV program? Most use straight cuts or fades from one scene to the next. My advice — don't be tempted to use a flashy transition just because it's available.

ies from your video: Manual creation and Instant Movie:

- 1. Plug your DV camcorder into your computer—using an IEEE 1394 (FireWire, i.LINK) connection.
- 2. Select the "Organise" tab and then "Get Media" icon selecting device icon (DV Camcorder in my case).
- 3. Premiere Elements does the one-step process of capturing your video.
- 4. Adobe Premiere Elements automatically finds all the footage on your tape
- 5. Separates your clips into scenes
- 6. And presents them in order, ready for editing.

The screen grabs on page 5 (Figs. 1 to 4) show the import video clips process. Note in particular the four main options tabs in Fig. 2. ("Organise", "Edit", "Disc Menus" and "Share"), where you select the device you want to use. When your connected device is shown, click on it and one is then connected (in my case) to my DV Camcorder through the Firewire connection where it takes control of the camcorder's controls allowing one to play the camcorder and import video footage.

The screens on the previous page (page 6) show the processes geared to guide the user through the usual flow of video production from capture to editing, adding transitions, special effects and titles, creating DVD menus, and on to burning a DVD that is capable of playing on your home DVD player, or for exporting to formats perfect for Web streaming or e-mail — the whole process being intuitive and relatively simple.

### Editing

Each part of the video editing process has its own standard window arrangement, which you can adjust to suit your own preferences. The interface adjusts automatically, and individual tool cursors cleverly change to give you instant feedback on the task at hand. If using the Instant Movie tool that automatically creates a movie with music and transitions, the new Smart Tags feature Smart Fix attempts to identify any unsuitable video footage such as obviously out of focus clips, those suffering from excessive hand-held photo-shake, poor lighting etc. and automatically adjusts the footage to ensure they're not included in the final Instant Movie footage. As well as Smart Fix other automatic tools include Smart Trim and Smart Mix. The Smart Trim tool automatically detects the usable portions of your clips, so you can trim out the unusable bits with ease. Smart Mix can for example automatically reduce the volume of your backing music track so your foreground sound is not drowned out.

There is also a fun animation option that lets you use linked superimposed graphics of moving people or objects within video clips as shown here using a green sheet as a

chroma key background (above).

On the whole the editing process is fairly simple to master. But once you start delving past these simple and relatively easy to use tools, perhaps for example because you want to be more creative, things start to get complicated. You loose the initial simplicity and enter the realm of more complicated screens and difficult to interpret controls which is not helped by the absence of a printed manual. Premiere Elements 7 came with a useful 200-page printed manual. Premiere Elements 8 comes with none!

### Integration

Where Premiere Elements is likely to score is with its integration with Adobe Photoshop Elements 8 (see John Child's review on page 8). User's of Adobe's highend video editing products to whom I've talked, almost without exception use Photoshop, or CS4 (Creative Suite 4) as it's called nowadays, as their graphical editor of choice for manipulating and integrating photos or graphics into their video production. Premiere Elements 8 users will I suspect choose Adobe Photoshop Elements 8, because of the close integration between the two programs. Conversely, I wouldn't mind betting that Photoshop Elements users who want a video editor that will integrate with their image editor will choose Premiere Elements as their video editor of choice!

One nifty feature is that it's possible to use Photoshop Elements to edit any image on the Premiere Elements timeline should you wish, with the timeline image being updated automatically. However, one doesn't necessarily need to rely on Photoshop Elements to import a still photo image as any suitable graphic image on your computer or from a memory card can be imported.

On the previous pages I've added a selection of screen grabs showing the editing interface in action.

### DVD Creation

Having edited your video project to your satisfaction the final process is creating a DVD for use in your domestic TV DVD player or for sending to friends or family. Creating (burning) a DVD in Premiere Elements is simple, Adobe have included an excellent selection of pre-designed DVD templates for weddings, birthdays etc. These can be linked to the opening screen to allow the viewer to jump to the required scene or clip, very much like a commercial movie DVD.

Also available is a selection of motion DVD menus designed to enhance your project.

### Conclusions

Premiere Elements 8 is an interesting consumer level editor with many high-end features. Despite an initial antipathy (I hate learning something new and complicated) I've now grown to like it as the various menu options and choices become easier to understand and use. I still think the raw novice with no experience of video editing should look elsewhere, but for those familiar with video editing who aspire to higher things, Adobe Premiere Elements is a useful step up the video editing ladder.

### Pros

- 1. Adobe Premiere Elements can be considered as the 'Poor-mans' Adobe Premiere CS4, because it comes with many of the features of Adobe's professional editing package but without the cost.
- 2. Has a wide selection of import formats.
- 3. Excellent titling.
- 4. Integrates superbly with Photoshop Elements 8 (or earlier).

### Cons

- 1. Although much easier to use than the earlier version I tried, I still consider it not as intuitive as some of its competitors. If you are a novice be prepared for a long learning curve once you want to use more than the basic simple video editing menus.
- 2. Whereas nearly every other video editing package calls a storyboard a storyboard (the feature where one drags clips around for editing), Adobe in their wisdom call it a "Sceneline" which is a little confusing.
- 3. The biggest weakness is that there is no printed manual. Version 7 had a 200-page printed manual covering Premiere Elements, this one has none. The only help is on-line via the Web.

# **Adobe Photoshop Elements 8 for Windows**


### Introduction

Adobe has recently updated this program and I must admit I was curious to see how it performed. It is available in versions for both Windows and Mac platforms, but whilst the Windows version contains an organiser, the Mac version does not. I believe this is because the free program iPhoto which comes as part of the Mac operating system and which can be updated for a price is regarded as good enough to act instead. For my photography needs I use Adobe LightRoom v2 and Photoshop CS2 in their Mac versions. I was therefore interested to see if my needs could be met by a much cheaper product. For this review I have used the Windows version, which I am using on my MacBook Pro laptop using Windows XP running under Boot Camp. This enables Windows to take over the Mac machine and enables it to be to all intents and purposes, a Windows machine. It does not run in a Mac window but utilises all the resources of the machine.


cated to images so that they can be easily found later. One nice feature is the one allowing RAW files to be uploaded from a wide variety of digital cameras and Elements will recognise and work with them. The organiser is more basic than that found



This program provides the ability to organise your photos, editing them and outputting them in the form of prints, a slideshow, uploading to web pages or to be produced as photo books. It is quite a versatile program and on paper should cater for all a photographer's needs.

The first thing I noticed after installing the program was how slow it ran. My laptop is a Core Duo running at 2.00 GHz with 1.5 Mb of Ram and is therefore well above the minimum specifications required. You are presented with an opening screen with two choices: opening the Organiser or the Edit screens. If you go to the Organise screen, you can access all the images you have already downloaded. You can of course download images from files, camera, scanner, etc. Keywords can be alloin LightRoom but seems more than adequate for the task. At the top right of the screen are four tabs: Organise, Fix, Create, and Share. If you highlight an image in the Organiser and then press the Fix tab, the image opens in the Fix window. If you press the Fix tab without highlighting an image, the Fix window opens allowing you to then search for the image from where you saved the file. You have the choice of "Edit Full", "Edit Quick" and "Edit Guided." These categories are self explanatory. The range of adjustments is not as great as those in Photoshop but is more than adequate for most photographers' needs. All the more common controls such as Levels, Brightness/Contrast, Hue/ Saturation, Gradient Map, Crop, Clone, Perspective Control, etc. are all there. Unlike Photoshop, which is aimed at professionals, a certain amount of "hand-holding" is there if you want it.

More advanced cameras can allocate either sRGB or Adobe RGB (1998) colour spaces incamera to the images they produce. If you are producing images for the web then the sRGB colour space is ideal, whilst if you wish to print the image then the Adobe RGB (1998) colour space will be more suited. This is because the latter colour space can deal with more colours and more saturated colours than the former can. Imagine a box containing all the visible colours. The farther from the centre of the box you go, the more saturated the colours become - Red towards one corner. Blue towards another, Green towards the third (the box is not a cube). A colour space can be represented as a balloon blown up inside the box. The space taken up by the balloon is the portion of the total number of visible colours that fall within the particular colour space. Larger balloons contain more colours, or have a larger gamut, while smaller balloons hold fewer colours. The surface of the balloon has the most saturated colours that the colour space can hold. Any colours falling outside the balloon can't be reproduced in that colour space. Since larger colour spaces have larger balloons, they contain both more air volume (i.e. more colours), and the surface of the balloon is farther from the centre of the box (i.e. the colours are more saturated). Therefore, larger colour spaces such as Adobe RGB contain both more colours and more highly saturated colours than smaller spaces like sRGB. A comparison of the Adobe RGB and sRGB gamuts is below. As you can see, working with Adobe RGB allows you to see and print more of most colours.



Adobe RGB was designed to contain the entire colour gamut available from most CMYK printers. sRGB is a HP/Microsoft defined colour space that describes the colours visible on a low end monitor.

Photoshop Elements allows an image which has been tagged with a colour space to be colour managed in everything it does. I would have found it unusable if it did not. Some (Continued on page 9)

cheaper image editing programs ignore colour spaces, with the result that the colours they ascribe to the numbers (all images are essentially just lots of numbers whilst held on the computer) are anyone's' guesses.

There are many ways of manipulating images in the program: too many to mention them all, but a few interesting ones are the Bluer Skies filter- this improves the colour of the sky in an image, whilst the Toothbrush tool improves the whiteness of a subject's teeth. Another is the Scene Cleaner. Just take several images of a street scene with moving pedestrians and the Scene Cleaner will stack the shots together and subtract the changes between each exposure. Another feature of note is the Exposure Photo-merge which is a tool for producing High Dynamic Range images from several bracketed exposures. This results in images with detail in the deepest blacks and detail in the whitest whites, and is a useful tool to have. In digital photography it is very easy to lose detail in the highlights and this is one way of avoiding these burnt out areas in your images.

The Create module enables you to create a photobook, calendar, greetings card, photo prints, etc. I wasn't able to test the photobook facility, since you have to sign up on either Kodak or Shutterfly's sites first. In passing, I have just composed a photobook of some of my images and I used Blurb for this. The composing of the book was very straightforward using a small program downloaded from Blurb. It is not therefore essential to use Elements for this purpose, especially as you have more choice of companies when using the internet.

The Share Tab brings you to various options regarding some uses to which your images can be put, such as making an online album, burning to CD/DVD etc. Of course, you can always use the program to print your images!

### In Conclusion

I was very impressed with the quality of this program. Whilst it cannot match the

breadth of Light Room plus Photoshop, Photoshop Elements costs a lot less than those two programs. I think I could live with Elements as it seems to be able to do all I require in organising and fixing my images. Having said that, I have to confess that I do not understand why the program runs so slowly. My Windows copy of Photoshop CS 2, also running in Windows XP under Boot Camp on my MacBook Pro, is very much faster!

# **Corel Digital Studio 2010**

### Reviewed by Laurence Fenn

Corel's Digital Studio 2010 suite has four products bundled together. PaintShop Photo for editing your pictures, VideoStudio Express for editing your videos, DVD Factory to burn your pictures/videos and WinDVD to play the movies. Installation gives no choice of the products you want to install and no indication of the space the programs will take. This may part of the process to make the software easier to use, but several other cuts made make the suite ironically a bit more difficult to use. The installation adds shortcuts to PaintShop Photo 2010, VideoStudio 2010, DVD Factory 2010 and WinDVD 2010 to the desktop. It takes just over a gigabyte of hard disc space, when I checked the two directories in Program Files, CorelWinDVD2010 (160 MB) and Corel Digital Studio 2010 (948 MB).

Start Menu shortcuts include the Corel Digital Studio Desktop Gadget 2010 as well as the programs. This is a launcher that has four icons, Photo (launches Paint-Shop Photo), Video (launches VideoStudio), Burn (launches DVD Factory) and Play (launches WinDVD). Right clicking the app has two options to Auto Load Gadget (to launch at start up) and exit. As shortcuts are placed on the Desktop and the Start Menu and the Gadget just launches the programs, there is little point in having the gadget at all.

### PaintShop Photo 2010

As with all the apps, it uses a non Windows standard interface, but with Help, minimise, restore and close icons on the top right corner. There are two message preferences available from the Help menu, 'Keep me informed with the latest product related messages' and 'Automatically download free product updates and notify before installing'. There is no option to notify before downloading though.

When you register you don't have any details to type in, just a message that registration successfully submitted and you can download the free content. It opens your web browser to download a 15MB IncentivesSetup.exe. I installed the file but didn't know exactly what it added. Some message would have been helpful.

The help opens a web browser with the help files, instead of using the operating system's help interface. This is the same for all of the programs.

The first time the program is run, it searches for media to include in the gallery of folders. If you import pictures from a flash drive it does not scan the folders, so you have to manually browse for them. New folders in the same area appear automatically so you don't have to keep adding them. Importing photos only shows folders on your computer hard drive, not network folders. The thumbnails are almost square, not the actual shape of the photo, so landscape and portrait images look the same.

When editing your photo you can only apply

the effect using the slider; there is no option to type a value in, unlike PaintShop Pro. There's also no preview thumbnail, which going by the speed some of the effects takes, would have been a help. Some effects do have a small preview though

Sharing your pictures from the option at the top gives you a choice of Email, Facebook, Flickr or YouTube. Sending a picture via email works with Outlook or Gmail. You choose whether to embed the photo or send it as an attachment, and can select a size of small, medium or large. It gives an estimate of the file size, but not the dimensions. Facebook upload works fine, putting the photos into an album called Corel Uploader Photos on account. Any picture uploaded needs to be approved and can then be seen by others. Flickr works great as well once the Corel program is allowed to upload pictures/videos to your account. Pictures appear in your Photostream.

You can't resize pictures when you edit them, but you can save them with a new name or folder. To resize a picture, you have to select it in the gallery and put it in the media tray (the area at the bottom of the screen). Then you right hand click on the picture there and choose the resize to a new folder option. You choose the folder with a choice of small, medium or large. From a photo that was 3264x2448 this results in a 480x360 (small), 640x480 (medium) or 800x600 (large). You can put the picture in the same folder and it adds a number in brackets to the end of the file name. Why such a simple action as resizing an image is made so complex is beyond me.

Apart from editing photos, you have six options in the Create option: Photo Book, Card, Collage, Calendar, Slideshow and Backup Disc. Creating a photo book does not take account of the shape of the image, i.e. landscape pictures put in portrait frames. The photo can be panned, but it would be better if it automatically put landscape pictures in the correct frames. There are 7 styles (listed under Fun) but one style only shows half a photo on the page.

The Collage project suffers the same problem. You select photos to add to the media tray, which are used in the collage, but pictures are cropped without regard to the original orientation of the photo. Each image can be panned within the frame, or you can change the settings for the program to shrink the picture. If you do this there

will be a grey background and the frame will not surround just the picture. When you use small pictures a yellow exclamation symbol is shown in the collage, indicating that you may not get a good quality print from the small size.

Creating a calendar uses a style for the images you choose, but you have to select each page and change the style individually (so that's 12 changes). When I created a slideshow it was supposed to be set to fit to the music, but it didn't. The music started again for about a second at the end.

### VideoStudio 2010

You can't add titles to a movie if titles are already added. One template has titles at the beginning and the end, but you can only change the font, colour and words. You cannot change the style and cannot delete them. If you create a movie without titles, you can only add one set, which is added over the video, so you can't create a title screen with a plain background. These limits seem annoying as I'm sure it would not make the program more complex to add this ability.

You can trim video clips but it was very slow in setting the frames. You cannot set the frame by inputting a number or time frame, only by moving the start and end markers. You then specify if you want to keep or delete the selected part of the video.

Now you will obviously want to add your own music to the video, but there are problems with that. When I clicked on the button I could browse for mp3 files on my computer, but could not listen to them. The interface lists the details of the music, but anytime I clicked on the preview button I heard nothing. However, when I ticked the music and added it to the video, I could hear it when I previewed the project. You can change the balance between your background music and the soundtrack of the video, and either have the music fit the video (in which case it fades out at the end), or fit the video to the music.

When you are happy with your video you

can save it in a variety of formats: MPEG2 (three quality settings), MPEG4 (iPhone, iPod, Sony PSP, PDA-PMP, Mobile phone), H.264 (1980, 1440, 720 AVCHD), AVI (DV Only), Quicktime (three quality settings), WMV (HD-Best, HD-Better, Broadband, Pocket PC, Smartphone), 3GP (three quality settings). You cannot save in the DivX format.

I tried to Import video grabbed from DVD-RAM which was in widescreen. The MPEG was 720x576 but the aspect setting was widescreen. VideoStudio did not see the widescreen setting, so only saw a full screen (squashed) video. I was unable to grab video direct from the DVD-RAM disc with VideoStudio itself. VideoStudio 11 (the predecessor) could not import the video (although it previewed the clips fine) but DVD Movie Factory 7 did manage to import the clips as mpg files without any problems.

For both of the video products, you can preview the video in the opening gallery. Unfortunately it only shows the video in the thumbnail size instead of viewing it in a large screen.

### **DVD Factory 2010**

There are only five 'fun' templates to create your DVD menu, and there is no static thumbnail menu. All the menus have a moving preview. The inability to set the thumbnail picture is not a problem because of this, but I found running a preview of the menu crashed the program on Vista after a few seconds.

The projects default to a widescreen NTSC. There was no option to set your country, and therefore set the default to PAL, unlike the last full version of DVD Factory. It only burns to a blank disc although it can make video folders in the same process but you cannot just create the folders. I also found that I could not change the music for the menu. Each template has an mpa file attached for the music, but when I tried to add my own mp3 file and delete the mpa file from the project, it said the music was in use. Even rearranging the order of the music made no difference.

### WinDVD 2010

This is a pretty standard DVD/Media player but beware when playing widescreen clips that have a full screen frame. Some DVDs and clips recorded from television use a 720x576 full screen frame, but add a flag to tell the playback device that the clip is in widescreen and should stretch the frame. The default setting of fixed aspect ratio in the settings effec-

tively ignores this, and will show a squashed in image. Unticking this option means you can pull the size of the window to stretch the viewable area, and when you choose full screen on a widescreen it will stretch to fill the screen.

The open file dialog appears over the playback window, and gives thumbnails of the videos. The program does not remember the last folder viewed, and if you double click on the file to select it the file will play, but with the open dialog still appearing over the playback window. It also seems to take quite a few seconds to start playing. You can capture a still frame from a video, but instead of just using a key to capture to a file you have to use Tools, then Capture. This brings up a toolbar in the middle of the playback area with buttons to capture a clip or a picture, and the thumbnails appear underneath as you capture them. It was just a shame that this obscures half of the window. You can access help from the option on the window, but none of the dialogs in the program have context help. If you want to know about a particular setting, you have to search through the help file instead of clicking on a question mark and clicking on the setting in the dialog.

There was an update for the product (even though I had the first release of the software for only a week or so) but I had no idea how large the update was. I later discovered it was 19Mb but after installing it required a reboot at the end. The update then ran again when the computer restarted. I have no idea what it fixed, and the update is not listed on the Corel website at all. If you supply a fix for your program you should give the user a clue to what it actually fixes.

Another feature of the software is the right click option of 'Open with Corel Instant Viewer'. This works exactly the same as the Windows Photo Gallery option in Vista or the Windows Picture and Fax Viewer in XP except it makes the default sound every time you change the photo, and there is no options setting to turn this off. I do not understand why a feature that is available in Windows is added to the suite; it's just duplicating functions.

I may have been expecting too much from

the software, but the lack of intelligence in

the way it handles some pictures and videos means you won't get the high quality results you would expect without doing more work. If this suite is meant to provide an easy way of producing photos or videos, the limitations of the programs prevents you from doing this. As each of the programs are cut down versions of the full products, many features are missing. I'm not sure if the products are available separately, but the suite lacks in certain areas. If you run Windows 7 with a touch sensitive screen you can use the interface with your fingers. As I had Vista and a regular laptop I could not try this, and even if I had Windows 7 the screen is a regular one and so would only get grubby fingerprints if I did! I would hope that some of the problems with the suite (inability to preview mp3 files, the slowness of the programs and the way some programs crash when they encounter a file they cannot cope with) will be fixed in an update, but in the version I was trying, I would recommend getting the full versions of the programs individually.




### **Greeting Card Factory Deluxe 7** By Tony Hawes








Fig. 7: With the arrival of heavy snow just before Christmas I inserted a photo and a further inscription to complete my card interior — easy peasy!
